 Sami Uwodige'i dudo'a. Her name is Samatha Brown.

Wili Usdi: **ᏅᏓᏍᏁ ᏅᏐᏆ ᏞᏍᏐᏐ?**
 Hi'a-sg utseli dagwalela? Is this her car?

Eli: **Ꮮ ᏅᏍᏁᏐ?**
 Do usdi? Which one?

Wili Usdi: **ᏅᏓ ᏅᏐᏐ ᏞᏅᏏᏐᏐ.**
 Hi'a utana dalonige'i. This big yellow one.

Eli: **ᏐᏓ. ᏐᏍᏁ ᏅᏐᏆ ᏅᏐ.**
 Hadi. Gesdi utseli yigi. No. It's not hers.

Wili Usdi: **Ꮮ ᏐᏍᏍᏁ ᏅᏆᏆᏍᏍᏁ ᏞᏍᏐᏐ ᏅᏐᏆ?**
 Do iyusdi ulsuhwida dagwalela utseli? What color is her car?

Eli: **ᏞᏐᏐᏐ ᏅᏐ.**
 Gigage'i uha. She has a red one.

Possessive Adjective –atseli

agwatseli'i dagwalela tsatseli'i dagwalela utseli'i dagwalela
 my car your car his/her car

digwatseli'i dagwalela ditsatseli'i dagwalela tsutseli'i dagwalela
 my cars your cars his/her cars

Note: Most adjectives take agi-/agw- set pronouns. Adjectives take di- plural for 'my' and 'your.' Di- plural becomes ts- plural before u- 'his/her.'
